Two Bills Reform Healthcare Delivery System

"Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (PPACA) (Pub. L. 111-148)

Signed into law March 23, 2010

"Healthcare and Education Reconciliation Act of 2010 (Pub. L. 111-152)

Signed into law March 30, 2010



Summary of ACA as Amended

Requires most US citizens and legal residents to carry health insurance

Provided a 10 percent bonus payment for physicians in general internal medicine (2011-2016)

Created a 10 percent bonus payment for primary care physicians who practice in health professional shortage areas (2011-2015)

Provides health insurance tax credits

Expands preventive care services



Summary of ACA as Amended (continued)

Establishes the Independent Payment Advisory Board (IPAB)


Establishes a hospital value-based purchasing program in traditional Medicare

Creates Accountable Care Organizations (ACO's)

Expands the Physician Quality Reporting Initiative (PQRI becomes PQRS)





Presidential Documents

Executive Order 13765 of January 20, 2017

Minimizing the Economic Burden of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act Pending Repeal

By the authority vested in me as President by the Constitution and the laws of the United States of America, it is hereby ordered as follows:

Section 1. It is the policy of my Administration to seek the prompt repeal of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act (Public Law 111–148), as amended (the "Act"). In the meantime, pending such repeal, it is imperative for the executive branch to ensure that the law is being efficiently implemented, take all actions consistent with law to minimize the unwarranted economic and regulatory burdens of the Act, and prepare to afford the States more flexibility and control to create a more free and open healthcare market.

Sec. 2. To the maximum extent permitted by law, the Secretary of Health and Human Services (Secretary) and the heads of all other executive departments and agencies (agencies) with authorities and responsibilities under the Act shall exercise all authority and discretion available to them to waive, defer, grant exemptions from, or delay the implementation of any provision or requirement of the Act that would impose a fiscal burden on any State or a cost, fee, tax, penalty, or regulatory burden on individuals, families, healthcare providers, health insurers, patients, recipients of healthcare services, purchasers of health insurance, or makers of medical devices, products, or medications.

The Process...Reconciliation

House and Senate approved budget resolution requiring \$1 billion in deficit reductions from 2017 through 2026

Ways and Means, Energy and Commerce, Finance and HELP Committees

Senate consideration of reconciliation legislation only requires a simple majority

Limits debate to 20 hours and prohibits extraneous amendments

Provides narrow path for legislation to be considered and approved with reduced procedural hurdles



The Fundamentals of the Legislative Process "Regular Order"

Regulatory Process Implements Enacted Legislation.

President Signs Legislation into Law or Veto is Overridden.

Other Chamber Considers Same or Similar Legislation. Any Differences in Approved Legislation Must be Conferenced and Approved by Both Chambers.

Chamber Approves Legislation With or Without Amendment.

Committee Conducts Hearings and Marks-up Legislation. Committee Refers Legislation to the Full Chamber.

Bill Introduced and Assigned to Committee(s) of Jurisdiction.




Congressional Action by the Numbers
