Exploring Role of OPP in Patient Care Session Filling Up

Members who wish to participate in the "Exploring the Role of OPP in Daily Patient Care" symposium during the 2017 ACOI Annual Convention should complete their registrations quickly. This session, which will take place on Saturday, Oct. 20, is limited to 24 participants. Only seven seats remain at this time. Once 24 participants enroll, a waiting list will be created.

The interactive, half-day symposium will include discussion and hands-on activities that try to place Dr. Still's vision for osteopathic medicine within the context of 21st Century healthcare. It will also identify how this aligns to ACOI's vision, mission, and values. Presentations will address such issues as the osteopathic lexicon--- what is meant by OPP, OMM, and OMT; balancing patient care influenced by OPP (thinking osteopathically) and patient care guided by OPP (treating osteopathically). There will also be small group breakouts on OMM and a case study providing a model for presenting evidence-based OMM cases. AOA Settles Class Action Lawsuit

The AOA announced late in July that it has settled a class action lawsuit brought by four members who challenged the requirement that ties AOA board certification to membership in the AOA. In the settlement, AOA agreed among other things to permanently decouple certification from AOA membership, to reduce AOA dues by \$90, which is the amount it charged as a certification maintenance fee, and to freeze AOA dues through May 31, 2022. The AOA also agreed to pay court-ordered attorneys' fees of \$2,617,000 and payment amounts of up to \$15,000 to each of the four class representatives.

The settlement does not affect membership in the ACOI since there is no requirement tying certification to ACOI membership.

AOA Certification/Membership Decoupling

Many members may or may not know that the AOA has settled a class action lawsuit that challenged the AOA policy that holders of AOA board certification must also be members of the AOA. The settlement terms are detailed elsewhere in this newsletter and on the AOA website. Your ACOI membership has never been coupled to your board certification in Internal Medicine or its subspecialties. Thus, your ACOI membership and participation remains unaffected by this settlement. If you have any further questions, please do not hesitate to contact the ACOI office.

Regarding AOBIM recertification, the ACOI is working closely with the AOBIM Board and the AOA to create a process to replace the high stakes, 10-year recertification examination. This is an extremely important initiative for our members and diplomates of the AOBIM. We are diligently working together to create high impact and online recertification content that is focused on patients and osteopathic practice and principles. More to come in the near future on this very delicate transition.

ACOI Branding Campaign

As we continue to transition to a professional services organization and a broader membership, the ACOI Board of Directors has engaged a consultant to help brand our style and philosophy of patient care. CMS Announces Support for Step Therapy

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) announced that it will allow Medicare Advantage (MA) plans the option of applying step therapy for physician-administered and other Part B medications. Step therapy is a type of prior authorization where patients are required to first try less expensive medications before specific, more expensive drugs are permitted. Under new guidance issued by CMS, MA plans can begin using step therapy for Medicare Part B drugs beginning January 1, 2019. Under this new policy, step therapy can be applied only to new prescriptions or the administration of Part B drugs for beneficiaries who are not actively receiving the affected medication. This new guidance is part of the Administration's ongoing efforts to reduce the cost of prescription drugs. According to a statement by Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Alex Azar, "By allowing Medicare advantage plans to negotiate for physician-administered drugs like private-sector insurers already do, we can drive down prices for some of the most expensive drugs seniors use." ACOI and Others Support Funding for Health Professions Programs

The ACOI and other members of the Health Professions and Nursing Education Coalition recently sent a letter to the House and Senate appropriators supporting funding for the Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA) Title VII health professions program for fiscal year 2019. The letter also expressed disappointment with the proposed termination of the Health Career Opportunity Program designed to ensure a culturally competent workforce. As the appropriations process continues, the ACOI will closely monitor funding decisions that impact the physician workforce and the healthcare delivery system. CMS Reinstates Risk Adjustment Payments under the ACA

CMS recently issued a final rule reinstating risk adjustment payments established under the Affordable Care Act (ACA). The final rule was issued following CMS' earlier announcement that it would no longer make the payments to insurers. In reinstating the payment, CMS stated that immediate action is needed to maintain stability in the individual and small group health insurance markets. The reinstated risk-adjusted program is one of three premium stabilization programs created under the ACA.

Cities File Suit against the Administration

A lawsuit was filed in federal court by four cities alleging that the Administration is acting to sabotage and nullify the ACA. The suit claims that expanded access to non-compliant health plans, reduced funding for outreach, a condensed time to enroll through ACA marketplaces, and other activities underline the Administration's efforts to undermine the law. As a result, the suit alleges insurers are leaving ACA marketplaces, premiums are increasing, and the resulting increase in the number of uninsured are leaving the cities to bear the financial impact of these actions. The cities that brought the action are Columbus, Ohio, Baltimore, Maryland, Cincinnati, Ohio, and Chicago, Illinois.

Washington Tidbits The Duel...Wait, Which One?

An investigation was undertaken in 1792 by senators James Monroe, Frederick Muhlenberg and Abraham Venable into a financial situation regarding the alleged misappropriations of federal funds. Two individuals serving jail time suggested that then-Secretary of the Treasury Alexander Hamilton was a co-conspirator. While the investigation did not find that Hamilton was involved in any criminal activity, the ensuing investigation uncovered an affair between Hamilton and Maria Reynolds. The payments in question that Hamilton made to James Reynolds, Maria's husband, appeared to be part of a blackmail scheme to cover-up the affair. The matter was dropped – or so it seemed.

Monroe claimed to have bundled up the investigative materials and sent them to a friend in Virginia, most likely someone by the name of Thomas Jefferson. History suggests that Monroe's clerk made copies of the materials and provided them to a reporter who, in turn, published pamphlets with the information about the investigation. Hamilton confronted Monroe about the release of the materials and the matter escalated to the point where Hamilton and Monroe were on the cusp of a duel to protect their honor. It appears that Hamilton questioned Monroe's truthfulness and Monroe in turn called Hamilton a scoundrel. The highly-ritualistic process of dueling required that each participant select a second to negotiate on his behalf. In this instance, Monroe's second was able to deescalate the matter so that no shots were ever fired and both men were able to save face. Monroe's second, who was able to rein the two in and prevent the duel, was another public figure. Hamilton and Monroe's second would meet again a few years later – his name was Aaron Burr!

ABIM Delays Program Director Certification Requirement

The American Board of Internal Medicine (ABIM) has pushed back to 2022 the implementation date of its controversial policy requiring program directors to be ABIM-certified in order to attest to resident competency to sit for ABIM certification. The policy, which stands in direct contradiction to the ACGME policy recognizing AOA certification of residency program directors, originally was scheduled to take effect in 2020.

ACOI, the AOA and others have been working to convince the ABIM to drop the requirement. None of the other allopathic certifying boards has announced an intent to adopt a similar position. This, and other topics, will be addressed at a special session for medical educators planned for the ACOI Convention in Orlando.

talking Science education

Talking Education

Seasoned clinicians have vast experience in patient interactions, through which they have learned many helpful communication techniques. But, in this era of evidence-based medicine, we should be more discerning. Dr. Calvin Chou of UCSF and the Academy of Communication in Healthcare offers an excellent perspective in the March, 2018 issue of the NEJM Catalyst on the importance of utilizing evidence-based communications with our patients. In his piece entitled, "Time to Start Using Evidence-Based Approaches to Patient Engagement," Dr. Chou challenges us with the question, "Would you trust a surgeon who told you, 'I haven't had any formal training for this procedure, observed any experts, nor received feedback on my skills, BUT over the course of time, through trial and error, I think I've found what works for me?" That is essentially how physicians were "trained" in communication skills for decades. Particularly as osteopathic physicians, we know that the right thing is to communicate effectively, humanistically, and compassionately. Fewer of us are aware that, over the past quartercentury or so, patient-clinician communication has become a prominent field of scientific research. Important findings from these data affect almost every patient interaction we have.

Communication is a skill no different than taking a blood pressure or doing a colonoscopy. The big difference is that we assume we have mastered this skill by simply graduating from medical school and completing graduate training. While communication skills training is not a health care panacea, it can reliably improve quality of care, patient outcomes, and the patient and provider experience. Indeed Debra Roter's research has demonstrated that the best predictor of patient satisfaction is physician satisfaction; and the physician's satisfaction is rooted largely in the relationship with our patients¹. In some instances, the data have existed for well more than a decade, yet only recently have market forces, such as value-based purchasing and emphasis on patient experience, started to exert influence on these most interactive — and human — of provider behaviors. Look at the work of Debra Roter at Johns Hopkins or Helen Meldrum at Bentley University to name just two. Though there are glimmers of hope at places that have adopted provider communication training — such as Hopkins, Harvard, Mayo, the Cleveland Clinic, and several other health systems across the country — we still have a long way to go. As recent technological advances drive people toward interacting with devices rather than directly with others in the health care setting, interpersonal communication skills have never been more important. In the high-stakes setting of health, well-being, and wellness, a trustful, caring relationship between patient and clinician leads to better outcomes for both.

Diabetes Dialogues

Glycated hemoglobin (HbA1c) likely causes coronary artery disease (CAD), but the underlying mechanisms are not yet clear, according to study results published in Diabetes Care² this June.

Previous studies have found that HbA1c is positively associated with cardiovascular disease (CVD), but the evidence has been primarily observational.

The study conducted by Yeung and others in the UK included 38 genetic variants strongly and independently related to HbA1c (n=123,665) applied to the UK Biobank data (n=392,038).

The researchers used inverse variance weighting (IVW) to determine the associations between HbA1c and CVD, CAD, stroke, and stroke subtypes. They performed sensitivity analyses included Mendelian randomization (MR)-Egger, a weighted median, and exclusion of potentially invalid single nucleotide polymorphisms (SNPs).

Using IVW, the researchers found that HbA1c was not associated with CVD (odds ratio [OR] 1.11 per %; 95% CI, 0.83-1.48). HbA1c was, however, associated with increased risk for CAD (OR 1.50 per %; 95% CI, 1.08-2.11) with directionally consistent results from MR-Egger and weighted median. After the researchers excluded potentially invalid SNPs, the association became more pronounced (OR 2.24 per %; 95% CI, 1.55-3.25).

Due to a lower number of cases, the researchers could not determine the association between HbA1c and stroke and its subtypes.

This study provides more evidence of a causal role of HbA1c in CAD. It is possible that interventions that target HbA1c reduction *may* be potential targets for reducing the global burden of CAD.

Ms. Ciconte: Tell me why you have dedicated your time and talents to ACOI.

Dr. Good: I have dedicated my time in order to maintain the integrity of our degree and our specialty of internal medicine. It is important for the College to provide support for board certification for current members and provide assistance for ACGME's single accreditation

for future DOs.

The single accreditation decision occurred during Rick Greco's term as President, who followed me. I am pleased that the ACOI took a leading role in addressing this critical change.

Important Notice About the Settlement of Class Action Litigation Against the American Osteopathic Association ("AOA")

If You Were a Member of AOA or Paid AOA Dues on Behalf of an AOA Member at Any Time Since August 1, 2012, You May Be Eligible for Benefits from a Class Action Settlement.

If you did not pay your own membership dues, please share this information with the person or entity that paid dues on your behalf; if you paid dues on behalf of one or more AOA members, please share this information with the AOA members.

A Settlement has been reached in a class action lawsuit challenging the AOA's policy that holders of an AOA Board certification must also purchase membership in the AOA in order to maintain their Board certification, and alleging that holders of AOA "lifetime" certification were injured by allegedly fraudulent statements or intentional omissions made by the AOA that allegedly constituted misrepresentations of the "lifetime" nature of the AOA Board certifications originally granted as "lifetime" certificates. The AOA denies any liability or wrongdoing, and the Court has not decided which side is right. However, to avoid the costs and risks of litigation, the AOA has agreed to a settlement.

Who is Included? The Settlement Class consists of all persons who were AOA members and all persons or entities who paid dues on behalf of any AOA member at any time since August 1, 2012. There are also sub-classes comprised of (1) all members of the Settlement Class that have held AOA Board certifications since August 1, 2012; and (2) all members of the Settlement Class who were given "lifetime" Board certification.

What Are the Settlement Terms? The AOA has agreed to the following settlement terms:

- Rescission of the Challenged Rule: The AOA shall permanently decouple AOA
 Board certification from membership in the AOA, such that, as of the Effective
 Date of the Settlement, AOA Board certification shall no longer be conditioned
 upon membership in the AOA;
- <u>Termination of Board Certification Maintenance Fee</u>: The AOA shall, for the
 period from June 1, 2019 through May 31, 2022, terminate the Certification
 Maintenance Fee (currently \$90 per certification) that the AOA currently charges
 AOA Board-certified DOs. The Certification Maintenance Fee may be reinstated
 at any time after May 31, 2022, if approved by the AOA House of Delegates
 ("HOD");
- <u>Dues Reduction</u>: The AOA shall reduce the Annual Regular Membership dues (currently \$683) by \$90 for the 12-month period beginning June 1, 2019 through May 31, 2020. It shall not increase the Annual Regular Membership dues above that reduced amount for the period from June 1, 2020 through May 31, 2022. Any changes to the amount of Annual Regular Membership dues after May 31, 2022, shall be determined by the HOD, in accordance with the AOA's Constitution and Bylaws;
- <u>Lifetime Certification Holders</u>: AOA will not require Board-certified DOs who
 received "lifetime" Board certification to participate in Osteopathic Continuous
 Certification ("OCC") or to remain members of AOA. However, lifetime
 certification will continue to require a license to practice in good standing for the
 state or other jurisdiction in which the physician practices, specialty specific
 Continuing Medical Education identified by the certifying board, and no evidence
 of unethical or unlawful conduct by the Board-certified DO;
- <u>Continuing Medical Education ("CME")</u>: The AOA shall, for the period from January 1, 2019 through December 31, 2021, make available to all AOA members who purchase Annual Regular Membership two courses from its online CME programming on a complimentary basis, subject to an aggregate maximum of 12 CME credits each calendar year;

- CME Acceptance for AOA Membership: The AOA shall recognize accredited CME whether taken in person or online, for purposes of maintaining membership in the AOA and will not impose membership requirements as to the number of CME credits that may be taken online versus the number of CME credits that must be taken in person. However, AOA specialty boards can identify requirements for the number of online or in person CME credits that must be taken to maintain AOA Board certification;
- No Enforcement of CME Requirements for Non-Board Certified DO Members:
 The AOA may maintain CME requirements as aspirational goals for members. However, physicians will not lose membership in AOA as a result of failing to meet the CME requirement, provided that the physicians meet the CME requirements for the state(s) in which they practice;
- Osteopathic Awareness Campaign Expenditures: For each of the Fiscal Years June
 1, 2019-2020 and June 1, 2020-2021, the AOA shall provide funding of not less
 than \$2 million for the D.O. Osteopathic Physician Brand Identity Campaign,
 which refers to the campaign to promote "osteopathic medicine to a wide
 audience," described in detail on the AOA's website at:
 http://www.osteopathic.org/inside-aoa/about/Pages/doctors-that-DO-campaign.aspx;
- Establishment of Independent/Private Practice DO Task Force: The AOA shall establish a task force comprised of between five and seven members who are independent private practice DOs or DOs who practice in an independent private practice DO group, all of whom are engaged in direct patient care. The membership of this task force will be determined at the sole discretion of the AOA Board of Trustees as long as the members meet the above qualifications. The task force will be treated like any other task force. The task force shall be established for a minimum of three years;
- <u>Costs of Notice</u>: The AOA shall bear the costs relating to notice to the Settlement Class and Sub-Classes.
- Attorneys' Fees and Class Representative Service Awards: The AOA has also agreed to pay a court-ordered award of attorneys' fees and costs, up to a total amount of \$2,617,000, and that Class Counsel will request that service payments of up to \$15,000 be paid to the four Class Representatives for their service on behalf of the whole Settlement Class.

How Do I Get These Benefits? A Settlement Class Member will receive these benefits from the Settlement automatically.

YOUR RIGHTS WIll BE Affected. YOU CANNOT EXCLUDE YOURSELF FROM THE SETTLEMENT CLASS OR ANY SUBCLASS. ONCE THE SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT BECOMES FINAL, YOU WILL BE BOUND BY THE TERMS OF THE SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT, INCLUDING ITS RELEASES OF ANY CLAIM THAT WAS OR COULD HAVE BEEN INCLUDED IN THIS LITIGATION. YOU WILL BE BARRED FROM MAKING ANY CLAIM OF ANY KIND, INCLUDING A CLAIM FOR MONETARY DAMAGES.

Your Right To Object. You may object to the Settlement by October 29, 2018. The Court has scheduled a hearing on November 9, 2018 to consider whether to approve the Settlement. You can appear at the hearing, but you do not have to. You can hire your own attorney, at your own expense, to appear or speak for you at the hearing. EDUCATION SESSION FEES

Fees for the 2018 education sessions are based on ACOI membership status and length of time in practice.
