Dear Representative Miller and Representative Kuster:

The American College of Osteopathic Internists (ACOI), representing the nation's osteopathic internists, medical subspecialists, fellows, residents, and students, is pleased to offer its support of the *Community Training, Education, and Access for Medical Students Act* (Community TEAMS Act) (H.R. 7528). ACOI appreciates your leadership to improve patient access to care in rural and underserved health professional shortage areas.

About 60 percent of U.S. colleges of osteopathic medicine are located in a federally designated health professional shortage area, and 64 percent require clinical rotations in rural and underserved communities, making them well-situated to not only help address physician workforce shortages, but in areas of the country where the need is greatest.

The grants created by H.R. 7258 would provide opportunities for colleges of osteopathic and allopathic medicine to secure more clinical rotations and learning opportunities in rural and medically underserved areas in partnership with federally qualified health centers, rural clinics, and other health care facilities with the goal of strengthening the physician workforce in these communities.

The practice of medicine in rural and medically underserved areas is unique because resources can be limited, including access to hospitals, testing and specialists, when compared to more urban areas. Medical schools can teach about these barriers, but H.R. 7258 creates opportunities for medical students to experience them firsthand as they work to care for and improve the health of patients in these communities.

Doctors of osteopathic medicine have a strong history of serving rural and underserved communities. This legislation will help to improve the pipeline of osteopathic medicine physicians who want to practice in these areas. ACOI calls on Congress to pass H.R. 7258 and to provide appropriate funding to the Health Resources and Services Administration to carry out the bill's objectives.
