

From President Lightfoot The Value of Our Certification Is Affirmed



Yes! Just what many of us hoped and waited for was affirmed on February 26, 2015. The Internal Medicine Review Committee (RC-IM) of the Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education announced that AOBIM certification will be accepted as a credential for osteopathic program directors under the single accreditation system. While this never should have been in doubt, the RC-IM became the first ACGME specialty to provide comprehensive acceptance of AOBIM certification. The Memorandum of Understanding governing the transition to the single system provided only for case-by-case consideration by the various specialty review committees. This action is a tribute to the

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ACGME Review Committee Recognizes AOBIM Certification

The ACGME Review Committee for Internal Medicine (RC-IM) announced late in February that osteopathic internal medicine and subspecialty programs seeking ACGME accreditation will be allowed to have program directors certified by the American Osteopathic Board of Internal Medicine. This is a major step forward in the transition to a single GME accreditation system under the ACGME.

The announcement applies to programs that are approved by the AOA and have matriculated residents on July 1, 2015, which is the first date that programs can apply for ACGME pre accreditation. Those programs will not need to name a co-program director certified by the allopathic American Board of Medicine Specialties. The decision to accept AOA certification was left to the individual specialty review committees under the terms negotiated by the AOA, ACGME and the American Association of Colleges of Osteopathic Medicine (AACOM).

Other sessions will provide information on the requirements for seeking approval for an osteopathic focus and ACGME requirements such as the Clinical Learning Environment Review (CLER), entrustable professional activities (EPAs) and more.

Supreme Court Hears ACA Oral Arguments

The Supreme Court heard oral arguments in the case of *King v. Burwell* on March 4. At issue is whether the ACA allows for the issuance of tax subsidies for plans purchased through federally-sponsored exchanges. The ACA includes a sentence that provides that an individual's tax credit is determined based on the cost of insurance purchased on an "Exchange established by the state." At question is whether the language means exactly what it says or whether subsidies can also be paid to those who purchase coverage through federal exchanges. The Court's interpretation and application of these words could result in the repeal of a key provision of the Act and effectively block tax subsidies from being paid in approximately 34 states where the federal government runs the exchanges.

The nine member Court is certain to be divided with one or two justices likely tipping the balance. Concern has been raised that if the Court determines that subsidies can be paid only to those purchasing coverage through their state, up to an estimated 9.3 million Americans will become unable to afford healthcare coverage. The Administration has indicated that there is no administrative action it could take to address an adverse ruling by the Court. Republicans in the House and Senate have stated that they will work to develop legislation to allow for a transition for those no longer be eligible for the subsidy and subsequently unable to afford coverage. Senate Republican leaders have indicated that they will work to advance legislation to end the federal mandate and allow for great consumer choice. House Republicans announced they will pursue legislation to allow for the sale of health insurance products across state lines, enact medical liability reform, and maintain some of the more popular provisions of the ACA, among other things. The pending decision by the Court is certain to promote continued debate of the ACA and its provisions. The ACOI will continue to monitor this matter.

CMS Extends Meaningful Use Attestation Deadline

The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services announced that it is extending the deadline for eligible professionals to attest to meaningful use under the Medicare Electronic Health Record (EHR) Incentive program to 11:59 Eastern Time on March 20, 2015. The original deadline was February 28. The Medicare deadline does not affect deadlines for the Medicaid EHR incentive program. Those who fail to attest to meaningful use in 2014 will see a reduction in reimbursement beginning January 1, 2016. The extension also applies to some of the EHR reporting option for the Physician Quality Reporting System.

New Report Shows Concern for Continued Physician Shortage

According to a report recently released by the Association of American Medical Colleges (AAMC), demand for physicians continues to grow faster than supply. With an aging and growing population and an increase in people receiving coverage under the ACA, it is estimated that there will be a shortfall of approximately 46,000 to 90,000 physicians by 2025. Specifically, the AAMC report finds that there will be a shortage of 12,500 to 31,100 primary care physicians and 28,200 to 63,700 non-primary care physicians. The report calls for a multi-pronged approach to address the physician shortage that includes innovation in delivery; greater use of technology; improved, efficient use of all health professionals on the care team; and an increase in federal support for residency training. The report's findings are certain to be discussed by policy makers in Washington.

House Committee Approves Medicare Legislation

The House Committee on Ways and Means approved four bills addressing the Medicare program. One bill would require the removal of Social Security numbers from Medicare cards and require valid prescriber National Provider Identifiers on pharmacy claims. Another bill would require bid surety bonds and state licensure for entities submitting bids under the Medicare durable medical equipment, prosthetics, orthotics, and supplies competitive acquisition program. The third bill addresses certified EHRs in ambulatory surgical centers. Finally, the Committee approved legislation requiring hospitals to provide certain notifications to individuals who are classified as under observation status and not admitted as patients. It is not clear when the full House will act on these legislative packages.

Washington Tidbits:

Waning Days of the Civil War – Part 1

With the Civil War in its waning days, President Abraham Lincoln delivered his second inaugural address 150 years ago on March 4, 1865. Its tone and length shaped by years of war, was vastly different from his first inaugural address delivered just four years prior, when the Nation was on the brink of war. Barely 700 words in length, recognizing that public declarations have been made at "every point of the contest," and that "little that is new could be presented," President Lincoln called for the Nation to begin to heal its wounds. He concluded his final speech, "With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in, to bind up the nation's wounds, to care for him who shall have borne the battle and for his widow and his orphan, to do all which may achieve and cherish a just and lasting peace among ourselves and with all nations." Within just a few weeks, history would again be written....



coding CORNER

The information provided here applies to Medicare coding. Be sure to check with local insurance carriers to determine if private insurers follow Medicare's lead in all coding matters.

Transitional Care Management

Transitional Care Management (TCM) is a care concept initiated by Medicare in 2014. The two Current Procedural Terminology (CPT) codes for these services are 99495 and 99496 for the 30 days of care provided by a physician or other qualified healthcare provider. CPT codes 99495 and 99496 are used when billing for care services for patients transitioning from an inpatient hospital setting, skilled nursing / nursing facility, partial hospitalization or observation setting into the community (home, domiciliary, rest home, assisted living). The TCM codes encompass providing or overseeing the management and coordination of services, as needed, for all the patient's medical conditions, psychosocial needs and work with activities of daily living support systems.

There are specific face-to-face and non-face-to-face duties for the licensed clinical staff and physician. These include contact with the patient within two days of discharge, medication reconciliation and a face-to-face visit with either moderate or complex medical decision making. The latter, along with the timing of the visit, determines which of the two codes are submitted. In the transition for the patient, a review of the discharge information to initiate or re-instate care with other providers and review and order testing as appropriate occurs. The provider is responsible for 30 days of TCM from the date of discharge. Only one face-to-face visit is required and bundled into the TCM codes. Additional medically-necessary visits are billable as separate services. Payment for this care management is made to only one provider. However, since CPT codes 99495 and 99496 are valued at about 4.8 and 6.8 relative value units (RVUs), respectively, their use can well be worth the work for this select set of patients.
